In 5th Annual Texas State Envirothon

The Texas State Envirothon was held on April 10 and 11, 2005, at The Big Thicket National Preserve, in Kountze, TX. The Envirothon is an academic, extra-curricular environmental and natural resource education program and competition designed for high school students. Teams of five students work together to answer questions focusing on five areas of study (aquatics, forestry, soils, wildlife, and a current environmental issue, which changes each year). In addition to the field experience, students also participate in an oral component focusing on a local environmental problem.

The competition began on Sunday afternoon at The Kirby Nature Trail in the Big Thicket National Preserve where students participated in the field test. The teams of students rotated from station to station, answering questions relating to each topic. Questions involved deductive thinking combining knowledge from all five areas, using the appropriate field equipment, and a total team effort. Sunday evening, the teams were presented with information focusing on managing cultural landscapes and were asked to develop a proposal addressing a management plan for the cultural landscapes of the Big Thicket National Preserve, the oral component of this competition. Areas of consideration included: Oil and gas drilling on park lands, control of feral hog populations, proper management of cultural resources, and environmentally responsible behavior. The presentation also considered the impact on economic, environmental and cultural issues. Leslie Dubey, Lisa

Jameson, and Mary Johnston (Ma Thicket), presented the background information to the students. The students were then sequestered with supervision for 3 hours to work on their presentations. The presentations were given to a panel of judges on Monday morning.

Awards are given to the top scoring teams on the field/written exam, by topic, and for the top team in the oral presentations. The winners were:
