**New York Times (ProQuest Historical Newspapers)** offers full page and article images with searchable full text from the first issue on September 18, 1851, to December 31, 2001. Coverage includes all pages in each issue, including news, editorials, letters to the editor, obituaries, birth and marriage announcements, historical photos, stock photos, and advertisements.

## STARTING NEW YORK TIMES

From the library's World Wide Web homepage (<http://www.uhcl.edu/library>), click on **Research a Topic**, then **Databases A-Z**. Select the tab **Databases by Name**, click **N**, and then click on the **New York Times (ProQuest Historical Newspapers)** hyperlink.

## HOW TO SEARCH

Choices of search methods are available as tabs across the top of the screen:

- **Basic Search:** allows keyword, quoted phrase, truncation and wildcard searching, and combining multiple keywords with Boolean and adjacency operators (**and**, **or**, **and not**, **pre/n**, or **w/n**, where **n** is a specified number, e.g., *symphony w/2 orchestra* finds *symphony* and *orchestra* within two words of each other in any order).
- **Advanced Search:** default search method; recommended for ease of use and flexibility. Allows command searching, the ability to view or select from a list of document types (under *More Search Options*), and a variety of date limiters.

## ADVANCED SEARCHING TIPS

Enter Boolean operators, proximity operators, and truncation or wildcard symbols directly into the search box:

<b>and</b>	haitink <b>and</b> berlin	finds records containing both <i>Haitink</i> and <i>Berlin</i>
<b>w/n</b>	broadway <b>w/5</b> musical	finds <i>Broadway</i> within 5 words of <i>musical</i> , in any order
<b>*</b>	theat*	finds <i>theatre</i> , <i>theatres</i> , <i>theater</i> , <i>theaters</i> , <i>theatrical</i> , etc.
<b>?</b>	wom?n	finds <i>woman</i> or <i>women</i>

**To view the entire page on which the article appears, click Page Map.**

**Click Abstract to see the Document View, which includes an abstract, word count, etc. If no abstract is available, a Citation link will be provided.**

**B**ERNARD HAITINK IS THE LONDON quiet man of music: a conductor who refuses to participate in the power politics of the international classical-music scene and who uses his status only to make sure his musical standards are met.
